ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 1, 2022 to AUGUST 31, 2023

Thank you Ken for your help with the nominations, and thanks to the Board Members who have agreed to stay on.

Welcome, Thank you for coming to the 56th annual meeting of members, I am Dana Skidmore, President of the Clinton Land Trust. (a slide show will run in conjunction with this report)

First slide is our "CLCT Crew". Without this fabulous group of humble, kind, motivated, fun, dedicated people none of the work you are about to see would have been accomplished.

A highlight of our year was being awarded a grant from the Community Foundation of Middlesex County. The monies awarded allowed us to partner with the Henry Carter Hull Library for many spring and summer programs as well as story walks and story hikes.

FINANCIAL STATUS

The Finance Committee, which includes our treasurer Jack Breen, Ken McDonnell, Mike Houde, and our bookkeeper Kathy Tessman. Our accountant Dave Reynolds and Dave Adams from Morgan Stanley Smith Barney, helped in compiling information for this annual report.

We started our fiscal year with investments and cash totaling \$ \$657,116 and ended our fiscal year on August 31, 2023 with investments and cash totaling \$768,660. This represents a net increase in our endowment portfolio of \$111,544. Dividends and interest earned on investments this year totaled \$9344.00. We received \$8932.00 in membership dues and for general donations, which include donations for the David and Alice Crosby Scholarship, land acquisition, programs and maintenance.

We had operating expenses of \$15,115 this year, compared with \$17,235.00 last year, which represents a decrease of \$2120.00. Expenses include costs for insurance, property maintenance, website and network support, accounting fees, printing and postage, boundary and trail maintenance, and our annual scholarship awards.

We completed and filed our 990 Tax Return as required by the IRS for the previous fiscal year. This report will be posted on our Website within the next week or two.

MEMBERSHIP

Our secretary, Sue Savitt, is in charge of taking our monthly minutes and also keeps track of our membership. We all appreciate the hours she puts in behind the scenes, cataloging contributions, managing spreadsheets and writing thank you notes. She always keeps us up to date and current. The total acreage owned by the Trust is 900.80 acres. The Trust also owns conservation easements on five privately owned parcels representing approximately 3 acres.

OUTREACH AND EDUCATIONAL EFFORTS

Sally Heffernan continued as chair of our Outreach Committee, which also includes Kim Flanagan, Coralie Williams and myself. This committee has been in charge of publicity and environmental education through various events throughout the year.

In February, CLCT sponsored a "Who's been in My Backyard?"Tracking Program led by Naturalist Erik Becker. Kids learned how to identify signs of animals both on tree bark , in rock crevices and with footprints in the dirt. (No snow this year!) In March, we celebrated the return of the osprey and were very grateful when the Menunkatuck Audubon Society offered to install an osprey cam on the Pratt Road nest. Thanks to the Allen Family who provided the internet, we were able to enjoy this osprey cam all summer long!

Also in March, 4 Bushy Hill Scholarships were awarded to Joel Students thanks to generous gift of Eunice Carter Symonds. For 15 years, thanks to her generosity, the Clinton Land Trust has been able to provide environmental educational opportunities to the children of Clinton. The 2023 scholarship winners were: Didier Orelluna, Aidan Langner, Emma Lawlor and Casey Gallardo.

The Trust kept busy in April providing opportunities to hike our properties with the Seniors in Clinton as well as Earth Day Cleanups at Joel School.

The Peeper Prowl is always a spring highlight when children and families come together donning headlamps, rain boots, waders, nets and buckets to explore the vernal pools at the Indian River Complex in search of salamanders, newts, frogs and toads.

I think its safe to say that The Outreach Committee all had a moment that night when we paused, looked around, and all we saw were headlamps and all we heard were spring peepers peeping and children being thrilled to be with their families in nature. Melts my heart!

Thanks to the Alice and David Crosby Scholarship fund, the Clinton Land Trust awarded Sophia Pacileo a check for \$1,000.00 to pursue future studies in science in college.

For the 17th year, Members of the Land Trust led stations at the Town Beach. Mike Houde educated kids about ospreys and conservation efforts, while I used buckets and nets and educated the 4th graders about vertebrates and invertebrates of Long Island Sound. This a a wonderful community event where the Land Trust works collaboratively with the schools, the shellfish commission and the Clinton Sailing Club. The Eliot Preserve is the location of our story hike installed this past spring. The book is: <u>If Bees Disappeared</u> and soon after this was installed, the Land Trust and Cindy Stevens Art Gallery teamed up to provide an experience for kids to spend the morning at the Elliot Preserve, reading about these pollinators and then culminating their nature experience by painting a beautiful scene. Co-sponsored by the Henry Carter Hull Library and the CLCT.

2023 marked the 17th year of Ecology Camp. 50 campers and 12 counselors enjoyed five mornings of science exploration at the Town Beach and the trails at Peters Woods and the Indian River Recreation area. Thanks to a grant from the Community Foundation of Middlesex County and support from the Land Trust, 5 campers were awarded Ecology Camp scholarships. Ecology Camp Scholarship winners were: Nathan Reeves, Piper Gabor, Ava Clarke, Lydia Templeton, & Laconia Shepard.

The goal of the Ecology Camp each year is to expose children to the different habitats in and around Clinton. By doing this, campers gain an appreciation for what is truly living in their "back yard." Through this educational experience, the hope is that these young environmentalists will continue to appreciate and protect the environment throughout their lives.

Throughout the spring and summer thanks to the GRANT we received from CFMC, the Land Trust and the library collaborated on many programs. This slide shows some of the amazing programs that took place at the library recently.

Also, the Grant allowed the library to showcase different children's books on the library story walk. One was "We are Water Protectors" and currently our latest story walk book is John Himmelmann's own, "Noisy Bird Sing-a-long".

On October 1st,, Board member Kim Flanagan chaired the annual Beach Cleanup at the Clinton Town Beach in conjunction with "Save the Sound." The Trust has sponsored our town beach cleanup since 2007. This year a team of dedicated volunteers (over 56!) gave their time to help us remove 386 pounds of trash from the Clinton Town beach and the shores of Cedar Island. This indicates that we are, as a community, making a difference and we hope that world-wide efforts are as well. The CLCT greatly appreciates the support of our community in helping us in this effort.

A huge thanks goes out to our social media committee of Kim Flanagan and Coralie Williams. Managing our website and putting out FB blasts really help to keep our story and our mission present in the community.
