In December: A GRANT from the CFMC was AWARDED!





In December 2022, CLCT was notified that we had received a grant from the CFMC. This grant was funded by Mary Janvrin and Natalie Janvrin Wiggins Fund of Birds, other and Animals and Nature.

The \$7,083.00 award allowed the CLCT to sponsor educational programs at the library (and CLCT properties) throughout the spring and summer for residents of Clinton (all ages).















CFMC Grant sponsored CLCT & HCH library story walks:


